From Our Area Dean... (1)

Reading Deanery is very excited about the opportunity to welcome the next Vicar of St Matthew Southcote. This single church parish is a great role for someone who loves parish ministry and wants to see the local church thrive. Working across two distinct congregations, this role will suit someone who is comfortable with both traditional and less structured worship styles and who is ready to embrace the diversity this entails so that all may flourish as valued members of the same church family. Supported by a strong team of lay leaders, and with good existing links into the local community, there are also ample opportunities to build and grow external relationships that will help the local church to be increasingly at the heart of Southcote life.

With its 29 parishes covering 24 benefices, Reading deanery has one of the largest synods in the country, despite covering a relatively small geographical area focused largely on the town of Reading itself. We have an active Chapter, which meets regularly throughout the year. We work closely with churches from all denominations, particularly through the "Transform Reading" and "Churches Together" networks. The concentrated nature of Reading provides many opportunities to work together to bring God into the day-to-day lives of the town and the c. 280,000 people for whom it is home.

From Our Area Dean... (2)


Recognising the size and variation in the deanery, we operate a dispersed leadership model, dividing the deanery into 4 operational zones (north, west, central, east/south). The Area Dean and Deanery Lay Chair have assistants to help resource these zones. Each pair of Area Dean and Lay Chair provides frontline support to clergy and parishes and oversee vacancies in their zone. They also take their share of cross-deanery work.

St Matthew's is in the western zone of the deanery. Our priorities as a deanery currently are to support parishes as they rebuild from the shocks of the last few years and discover new opportunities for mission and ministry both within individual churches and through partnership working. A particular focus – shared across Oxford Diocese – is to grow and develop our ministry to children and young people. Going forward, we believe that collaboration is the key to creating vibrant Christian communities, and we are keen to foster a culture where parishes are ready to co-operate with one another on areas of mutual interest, taking advantage of synergies and addressing gaps in local provision together. We are currently carrying out a review of future mission and ministry needs for West Reading to underpin a coherent strategy for the next season of our common life.



A snapshot of recent history...

Before 2011, St Matthews was traditional and liturgical in its churchmanship, but after the early retirement of the last-but-one incumbent, its dwindling congregation was joined by about thirty Christians from a more evangelical stable – mainly from Greyfriars Church, the largest town-centre C of E. Amongst them was the new priest-in-charge, later made Vicar.

Fusion has always been incomplete. 14 years on, the traditional and 'new' congregations largely worship independently in their preferred styles, but we do overlap.

Importantly, the congregations unite for both social and missional events, such as Church lunches, Southtots and other outreaches. They also transformed the main Sanctuary together, replacing uncomfortable old solid pine pews with 250 good-quality chairs — which has made the space much more flexible (and comfortable)!

The 10am Sunday service

alternates between an informal 'Service of the Word' and a Family Service with Communion. Music is contemporary in style and led by a band – we've been extremely lucky to have willing, multi-talented musicians. The sermon is generally 20 minutes.

This informal service is liturgy-lite and appeals to families and individuals looking for a more relaxed and contemporary style of worship.

More on Worship at St Matthew's (2)

The 11.45a.m. Sunday service follows the 10am on alternate Sundays and are similar to the weekly Wednesday service at 10.30a.m. These services are centred around the Eucharist. Both follow the Church of England lectionary and use the Rite A liturgy from Common Worship. Vestments are traditionally worn.

We are fortunate to have an organist who plays at our Sunday services, but on Wednesdays the service is held in the Chapel (see opposite). We use 'Hymns Old and New' on CD.

Teaching and Preaching at St Matthew's

Under the last incumbent, St Matthews developed its own preaching team. At present, two lay-members have been formally licensed by the Bishop of Reading, with two others initially authorised and committed to fulfilling licensing requirements.

Historically, our last incumbent preached at half of the informal and all the formal services.

The teaching 10am programme is arranged around a conventional four-month term, rotating between gospels, New Testament and Old Testament. The Lectionary guides the other services.

Our approach to scripture is doctrinally orthodox.



Baptisms, Weddings, Blessings and Funerals

- ➤ 1 Marriage Blessing
- > 0 Funerals

What's Interesting About Our Parish?

- The parish houses around 15,000 people and growing
- Opportunities there are fresh <u>new areas</u> untouched by the gospel
- There are multiple <u>partnerships</u>: joint projects with other Christians in the area sharing Jesus' message through word and deed
- St Matthews has a wide spread of age groups
- The Parish has areas that are in the UK's 10% most deprived AND the 5% least deprived! We are rich in <u>cultural background</u> both in St Matthews and outside. We have growing numbers of people from *many* parts of the globe including Poland, Nigeria, Ethiopia and India, to name a few
- St Matthews is incredibly well-situated in a prime position within Southcote. Its buildings and grounds are substantial, with huge potential

Children and Youth work

In the last few years, children's work has developed hugely under Lynn (our Children and Families worker). Kidz Church runs each Sunday morning, plus a youth group for teens. Two weeks a year in half-terms, we also run Holiday Club, often fully subscribed with over 100 children each day:

The Church Hub...

The Church hub started in January 2023 in response to the cost-of-living crisis and rising heating bills. What started as a winter 'warm space' project now runs year-round.

Each Friday after school, around 60 local people arrive to be fed and find friendship. In the better weather, the children play outside, whilst others enjoy crafts & games inside over a cuppa.

Where needed, support is given weekly to families we've met through the Hub. Several families have attended church as a result.

We collect food weekly from 3 organisations and distribute this among the families. We use what we can – it helps keep the food bill down! Over the year we have served up 1733 dinners, averaging around 46 meals a week.

The Training Room

Why a training room? Several parents from the Hub asked if we would teach their children how to cook the meals we serve - so the cookery school was born.

One special moment of affirmation was finding a box in the PCC garage containing all we needed to get started. The box had been in the garage for 10 years and inside, (among other items), were aprons for both adults and children.

God has provided £20,000 through fundraising, which has enabled us to convert the old storage room into a training room and provide storage facilities elsewhere, as well as refurbish and upgrade the kitchen.

Whilst cooking, the children can talk openly. Each session is tailor-made, but we aim to boost self-esteem, as well as teach coping strategies to help with their anxieties, and encourage effective nutrition (ignore the pictures!) We also share the love of Jesus with them.





Fellowship: Men's Ministry

Where we are financially

Over the last few years voluntary income has reduced whilst costs have increased significantly.

We have been highly successful in raising funds to refurbish the kitchen and training room. We are very thankful for the generous hearts of the congregation of St Matthew's who continue to give sacrificially towards our mission and ministry.

Opposite are the figures for the year 2024 compared with the previous year.

The PCC's policy is to keep three months of running costs in reserve to cover unforeseen circumstances.

Partnerships – Southcote Alive



Southcote Alive was created in 2011 to pull together Christians within Southcote from any church, for the purpose of creating a united witness. The three main Southcote Churches form the core. Several initiative have sprung from this:

- Café Alive 2014-present hosted in Grange URC. Includes periodic outreach events like 'hot potatoes and cool carols'!

Partnerships – RE Inspired and school links

- We have good links with our two local primary schools, Southcote Primary and Manor Primary School. We are able to take some assemblies in Manor Primary, and Southcote Primary visit our church 6 times a year for their school assemblies. They also take part in RE Inspired sessions.

Partnerships – TORCH

- TORCH (https://torchhub.org.uk) is a rapidly growing, Reading-wide partnership which started during Covid lockdown
- Originally church members picked up prescriptions for vulnerable people shielding at home
- The ministry has since widened both its range of activities and its volunteer base
- St Matthews has several active supporters



Coming Soon – The New Parish Nurse!



- Parish Nursing is a national charity:
 www.parishnursing.org.uk
- South Reading already has a Parish Nurse, attached to an Anglican Church. It is a very well-received ministry.
- Coley and Southcote are an urban priority for Reading Borough Council's Wellbeing Board. As a result, they are supporting a new Parish Nurse serving these areas, with St Matthews leading within Southcote.
- TORCH (see previous slide) is funding and managing this venture and has appointed Melanie Gager, who starts in early April.

Partnerships – Local Street Pastors



Street Pastors - a national organization - aims to be 'the hands and eyes of Jesus on the local streets'.

Out of St Matthews and a local secondary school grew the idea of 'local Street Pastors', in 2022. Ordinarily, Street Pastors patrol town centres (plus Reading Festival) but <u>local</u> SPs are a first-of-a-kind initiative. A cut-down version is still active.

Partnerships - Transform Reading





St Matthews has been a supporter of both Transform Reading and Churches Together in Reading. Transform Reading is the more evangelical, soft-charismatic and evangelistically ambitious of the two.

St Matthews has been active in both, but more so Transform Reading over recent years.

Buildings - the Main Church

Designed by Sir Basil Spence and graced by two John Piper windows, St Matthews opened in 1967.

The architectural appearance of the building, both externally and internally is minimalistic and designed for 'worship in the round'.

Originally pews, these have since been replaced with chair seating with a capacity to accommodate 250 people.

Not everyone's cup of tea aesthetically, but down to earth and unfussy, like the people in the parish.



Buildings - the Church Hall



Built in the 1950s along with most of central Southcote, this was the original church.

Now also home to the parish office, a recently installed extension to the kitchen.

The Vicarage

The vicarage was built in the 1960's and like the church building is simple in appearance.

Ground floor - study/reception room, toilet, kitchen, dining room and lounge.

First floor - 4 bedrooms, 1 bathroom

Sunny, south facing, large garden to the rear, with various shrubs and a rather nice cherry tree!
